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

Newcomers to the team included defencemen Fred Creighton, Mike Fischer and Jim Fleming along with forwards Don Slater, Chuck Henderson, Bill Swarbrick, Fred Denny and coach Ullyot.

Two of the old guard, defenceman Ken Terry and forward Bernie Bathgate, were released midway through the season while Nick Prevach, Marlowe McDonald and Al Dacquay started with the club but didn't stick.

Fleming and Fischer were two familiar faces to Kamloops fans, having performed for Elks in previous years.

Shifty centreman, Ken Booth, proved to be a real find and showed so well that Kenny McKenzie kept him up with New Westminster Royals of the Western Hockey League after a three game tryout in December.

Although the Elks finished out of first place this year the home fans gave them excellent support all season and the boys came through with some good games.

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BECKER TROPHY

One of the most beautiful trophies in Western Canada, surpassing the historic Allan Cup in this respect, came into existence last season in the FRANK BECKER TROPHY. Fresented by the league and named in recognition of the Vernon executive's long and valuable contribution to Valley hockey, it goes annually to the team finishing on top of the Okanagan Senior Hockey League in regular schedule play. It was won by Kamloops Elks in its inaugural season in 1952-53 and was captured this year by Penticton V's.

Boasting the longest record of service in the Okanagan hockey league is burly DAVE MacKAY of the Vernon Canadians. The 35-year-old defence bouncer is in his sixth season with Vernon, breaking in during the 1948-49 season when the league was still Intermediate class. Coach of the Canadians for two seasons during that span, he has also seen service with Chicago Black Hawks, Providence, Nanaimo and New Westminster.

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KEN ULLYOT

Kenneth Duncan Ullyot, coach of the 1953-54 Kamloops Elks Hockey Club, was born in Saskatoon, Sask., on June 29, 1922, and started his hockey with Saskatoon Quakers' junior team. His last year of junior hockey was in 1941 and the next season he played for Washington Eagles of the Eastern Amateur League.

From there the six-foot 155-pound centreman joined the armed services and was in the Air Force until 1945. He played with Saskatoon Elks of the Western Canada League during the 1945-46 season and then moved to New Westminster, where he has been up to this season.



GEORGE "SONNY" AGAR

GEORGE AGAR — Scoring king of the WHL, starry centre of the Calgary Stampeders, who hung up his skates as a professional with a record of 804 points amassed in 12 seasons of minor league professional hockey. Agar blinked the red light for 300 goals in league play. A terrific minor league record, one which will stand re-telling many times.

Now playing coach of the Vernon Canadians of the OSAHL the 33-year-old veteran (he'll be 34 in May) has lived up to his record as a prolific point getter, having garnered 78 points by the time there were only five games left to play of the 1953-54 schedule.

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
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"PHANTOM" PHIL HERGESHEIMER

Okanagan hockey got a big boost three seasons back when the Kelowna Packers signed Phil Hergesheimer, "Phantom" Phil of NHL fame as play-

schedule.
Grant Warwick started his hockey career with the Regina Parks League. In 1940 he was helping the Regina Rangers win the Allan Cup. In 1941 he joined the New York Rangers and won acclaim in that season as winner of the Calder Trophy for the rookie of the year.

His professional career was far from over when he decided to quit and join brothers Dick and Bill in Penticton. He has one ambition left in hockey — to bring the Allan Cup to Penticton.

KELOWNA PACKERS

Hockey in Kelowna has become such a strong spectator draw that many residents are hard put to remember the days when there wasn't any there.

Senior A hockey started in Kelowna in 1948 when the Kelowna Packers club was formed and players went on the ice in orange and black uniforms to play their first game that year on November 11, under playing coach Ken Stewart.

The 1948 lineup included Bob Taylor, goal; Jack O'Reilly, Ken Reeves, Eddie Witt (now a linesman for Packer games) and Stewart; Bud Gourlie, Gordon Mirtle, Mickey Meyers, Gordie Smith, Bob Johnson, Frank Hoskins, Jim Hanson, Herb Sullivan and Johnny Maddock, forwards. Carried in reserve were Jimmy Lowe, Glen O'Shaughnessy and Dave Newton.

In their first two games (against Vernon and Kamloops), Packers went down to defeat, but it wasn't long before they started to climb the ladder to hockey success. Four seasons after the club was first formed, Packers (now wearing their familiar red uniforms) beat Kamloops Elks in the playoffs and carried on into the Allan Cup quarter finals against Trail. They lost that one but came

home to the biggest ovation ever accorded a group of athletes in Kelowna.

Today, Packers are strong contenders for those same Allan Cup finals.

In Phil Hergesheimer — who joined the club in 1951 — they have one of hockey's most outstanding players, a playing coach who spent 17 years in pro ranks before joining the Kelowna club.

Packers have one of the best netminders in the business, Doug Stevenson, who joined the club late in the season and who has been responsible for sparking the club to victory on many occasions. Jim Hanson, Jack Kirk, Bob Leek and Bo Carlson comprise a strong defence, while Packers forwards include Don Culley, Phil Hergesheimer, Don Smith, Mike Durban, Jim Middleton, Frank Hoskins, Ken Amundrud, Bill McCulley, Paul Brilliant, Joe Connors and Bob Keil.

Of the original Packers of 1948, only Hoskins and Hanson remain.

That's the Kelowna Packers — in six seasons they've come a long way.



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

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

Everybody knows that last season they won the Western Canada Senior Hockey Championship and got knocked out in the Allan Cup finals. Everybody knows that they tied their tag to the Becker trophy as OSAHL champions for this season long before the schedule was played out.

Put flesh on the foregoing bony outline and you have a book about the V's, fledgling club of the OSAHL, only three seasons in operation.

There is nothing much to tell about the V's. They've told their own story before the thousands of valley hockey fans and fans at Fort William and far away Kitchener, Ontario. It's been the same story of a fighting team that takes its share of the beatings but won't admit it's licked until the final whistle.

Their first season hall marked the V's as a fighting club. Hopelessly outclassed, they never failed to give the fans their money's worth and often they defeated better teams by virtue of drive and the will to win.

The Penticton V's record in last season's playoffs is one that not only Penticton, but the entire valley can be proud of. The V's had to fight tooth and nail to get out of this league. It follows that every team in this loop was a potential Allan Cup finalist.

Penticton's first team was a game, but winless, organization that managed to sell hockey in an area that had never had a hockey team or even an arena. They fought with everything they had and while they didn't win many games it was their hustle and never-say-die attitude that gave hockey the big push in the south Okanagan. We say south Okanagan because the V's belong not only to Penticton but to Summerland, Naramata, Okanagan Falls, Oliver, Osoyoos, Oroville, Washington; Keremeos, Hedley, Princeton, and every place in between.

The second season of hockey saw the fans loyalty from this large area rewarded

when Bill Carse piloted the V's through a stormy season of league play to end up in third place. From this lowly position in the Okanagan League they went on to bring fame to Penticton by bringing home the Western Canada Championship.

Once again the V's are on the rampage and the green and white uniform has gained respect in every rink, in both leagues, of the interior of British Columbia. Coached by Grant Warwick the new V's are maintaining the reputation set in the two previous seasons giving fans everywhere a hustling brand of hockey with lots of color and never a dull moment — win or lose.

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
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
